

### In the news: how do I speak to my child about war?

Content they see online can also be polarising – dividing groups of people into either 'good' or 'bad', often using offensive or discriminatory language.

#### **Unit 4: Discrimination**

In this unit, students will be building on content explored during year 7 on diversity. They will again consider their identity, rights and responsibilities. Extending to think about what it means to live in a diverse society; what is kind and unkind behaviour and how this can affect others. They will focus on prejudice, stereotypes and discrimination. Building confidence on how to be an upstander.

### Discussion points/questions for home:

- Could you share role models with your young person? Ask them about who inspires them and why.
- Can you demonstrate to your child where their rights are being met in the daily lives?
- If your child has a phone/social media, do they know what to do if they see material they don't like, can they recognise material that reinforces prejudice and stereotypes.
